2017 Objectives


So what do we do to continue to grow and build on our 2016 successes? Two words: BUILD RELATIONSHIPS! At the end of the day the work always gets done, but those crews with the best RELATIONSHIPS on their team consistently produce the safest work records and highest quality product. Why is that? Because without interacting effectively with other people, we are not effective. When it all dilutes down, the key to healthy relationship lies in effective COMMUNICATION. This gets everyone on the same page and working toward a common team goal. Think about a winning sports team: you will never see their coach say, "just go out there and try really hard."



There is always a huddle to discuss the gameplan, and that plan is communicated clearly to the team. So.....How do **we** communicate more effectively?

 Use technology when appropriate. All of our crews have lpads available. Let's start using them for our huddles and toolbox talks!





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- 2. Reinforce. Make sure you deliver a clear message and reinforce the desired behavior of the person you communicated it to.
- Chain of Command. Establish clear reporting lines and communication in your crew.
- 4. Clear and concise. Avoid slang/jargon, keep communication simple.
- 5. Training. Make sure new employees know their work task, how to perform it, and who to ask if they have questions.
- 6. Encourage feedback. Sometimes all of the answers to the challenges of your work day are right there in your crew.
- 7. **GET AWKWARD!** Intervene when you see somebody doing something that is unsafe!

Winter Driving Safety



Maintain your car: Check battery, tire tread, winshield wipers, keep your windows clear and free of snow and ice.

Have on Hand: Flashlight, jumper cables, kitty litter, shovel, snow brush, cell phone.

Stalled?: Stay with your car, don't exert, run your car just long enough to stay warm.

Plan your Route: Allow plenty of time, be

familiar with maps/directions, let the party expecting you know your approximate time of arrival.

- Practice Cold Weather Driving!
 - During daylight, practice driving on snow/ice slowly in an empty parking lot.
 - Steer into a skid.
 - Know what your brakes will do
 - Don't idle for a long time with the windows up, or in an enclosed space.
